WE ARE WORKING TOWARDS BEING AN ASTHMA FRIENDLY SCHOOL



Unfortunately at this time of year the children in our school who suffer with asthma often experience a worsening of their condition due to the change in temperature. This can impact children in many different ways either by a child being absent from school, or not being able to take part in PE lessons or play outside with their friends as often as they would like.

We were informed of the Asthma Friendly School Campaign by the parent of one of our pupils who suffers with asthma, and we are currently working towards being an asthma friendly school. All our classroom and office based staff will undertake the training so that there will always be a member of staff nearby should a child with asthma need any assistance. Although we already met most of the criteria that is required to join up to the Asthma Friendly Schools Campaign, there is always room for improvement and the staff that have already undertaken the training have said that it has highlighted things that would not have been obvious before the training.

Once we are a fully fledged member of this campaign we will update our school website with the information.

The following information has been provided by the Asthma Friendly Schools Campaign:

Has your child got asthma or been prescribed a blue reliever inhaler? Many children with asthma and viral wheeze get worse over the autumn and winter months with coughs and colds that can trigger asthma and wheezing symptoms. There are some simple steps that you can take to make sure your child stays well over the winter.

Every child who has asthma should be reviewed once a year by their GP or asthma nurse. At this review you should be given a personal asthma action plan for your child detailing which inhalers they are on and when they should be taken, please bring a copy into your child's school. If you haven't had a review recently ring your surgery and book an appointment.

Your child's inhaler technique will also be checked at the annual review. Most school age children should be able to use a spacer through a mouthpiece like the ones below rather than needing a spacer with a mask. Make sure you are familiar with how to use the inhaler and if you're not sure ask your GP, asthma nurse or pharmacist. Make sure that you provide the school with an inhaler that is in date and let them know if there are any changes to your child's treatment.





Your school is working towards becoming recognised as 'asthma friendly' meaning that you should feel confident that your child is in the care of staff who have had additional training and understand how to manage asthma symptoms should they arise during the school day.






Talk PANTS is here to help you have a simple but important conversation with your child to help keep them safe from sexual abuse. From P through to S, each letter provides a simple but valuable message that can help children understand their body belongs to them, and they should tell someone they trust if anything makes them feel upset or worried. You've probably already talked to them about things like crossing the road safely. Having this conversation can feel just as natural, and be just as easy.

Why Talk Pants?

It is an important conversation to have. Of course, no parent ever wants to think their child will be affected by sexual abuse. But that's exactly why it's vital you have this conversation. It is also understandable that talking about this topic might feel difficult, but it doesn't have to be. Talk PANTS has been created specifically — with the help of parents and professionals — to make sure these conversations are easy and appropriate for children as young as three.

Talk PANTS never mentions sex. You might feel your child is too young to talk about sex, and that's why Talk PANTS never mentions it. The messages for children are practical, reassuring and age-appropriate. These messages help children understand their body belongs to them and they have a right to say no. Children are encouraged to tell a safe adult who they trust if anything happens that makes them worried or upset. They also let children know if anything happens that makes them feel that way, it's never their fault. You've probably already talked to them about things like crossing the road safely. Having this conversation can feel just as natural, and be just as easy. The Talk Pants guide never uses scary words. Talking PANTS is about using simple, child-friendly language to give your child the confidence and knowledge to understand what is and isn't OK. When you are ready to teach your child the five PANTS rules, the Talking PANTS guide will take you through each letter of PANTS so you know what to say about each one. You can start off by having a simple chat with your child about keeping safe - and then go into more detail when you are both ready. CRAWLEY SIGNAL BOX (BRIGHTON ROAD)

1st Crawley Scout Group

If your child is aged between 6 and 14 years of age there are Beaver, Cub and Scout groups available for them to join.

Beavers is a great starting point for any child aged between 6 and 7 years of age (if they are under 6 you can still put them on the waiting list). The weekly (term time) meetings are full of fun and their activities are based around making things, outdoor activities, singing, playing games, going out on visits, investigating nature, listening to stories, learning how to be safe and most importantly, making new friends. All the activities they do are always working towards a badge. It gives a child a real sense of achievement when they have put in some effort and receive a badge at the end of it, which can then be sewn on their uniform. Government and Local Council Resources

The government have an online tool to help people check the benefits and financial support they might be able to apply for. You can check at:

Your local council may be able to help you pay for things like:

- Energy and water bills;
- Food;
- Essential items such as clothes or even an oven.

This help is known as Welfare Assistance or the Household Support Fund. Each council runs its own scheme. The help they offer, and who can get it, varies. Ask your local council if they run one of these schemes. You do not have to be in receipt of benefits to get help from your local council. If you are in receipt of benefits, they will not be affected if you get help from one of these schemes. See below for information on the WSCC Community Hub.

COMMUNITY HUB

WSCC have a community hub for anyone who may need help. You can request support from the Hub, including accessing the Household Support Fund, and where to get advice.

WSCC are focused on making sure they continue to support the most vulnerable people in our community.

If your request is urgent, for example, you are going to run out of food within the next two days, please phone <u>033 022 27980</u> so that they can make sure you get the help you need as quickly as possible.



CHANGE OF DETAILS

If any of your contact details change (address, home phone, mobile etc), please inform the school office so they can update the school records accordingly.

MEDICATION

From time to time we will sometimes administer paracetamol to a child if they are feeling unwell, but it is not necessary to send them home. The brand we use is either Calpol paracetamol 6+ sachets or meltlets (so cannot be administered to anyone under 6 years old). For this to be administered to your child you will have needed to have signed a form giving your permission. We will always telephone you to get your permission before we administer any paracetamol, but without the signed consent form we cannot administer it in any event. If you have already signed a permission slip you do not need to do anything else. The above is also relevant for antihistamine's. We use Piriton, but only if the parent has provided written consent and also verbal consent just before it is administered.

TRIM TRAIL AND TYRE TRAIL

At the end of the school day it has been noted that parents are allowing their children to play on the trim trail outside the classrooms. If you do allow your child to use the trim trail (or tyres) at drop off/collection time it is **your responsibility** to ensure they use it safely. Please keep an eye on your children at all times during drop off/collection to/from school to ensure their safety.

MOBILE PHONES

Please can you remind your child that if they bring a mobile phone to school with them, they must **not** use the phone whilst on the school premises. All phones must be turned off when your child has arrived at school, and handed to their class teacher. All phones will be returned at the end of the school day.

BIRTHDAYS AND TREATS

We love birthdays, and we love celebrating them even more! If you provide sweets for a class in order to celebrate your child's birthday, we would ask that you ensure they are individually wrapped, nut free and, if possible, vegetarian. This will mean all of your child's classmates can celebrate their birthday with them. We are not able to hand out any cakes or sweets that are homemade.

Also, from time to time throughout the school year, we will give out sweet treats to children. We will ensure we always meet a child's dietary requirements. Please inform the school if you do not want your child to be given any sweet treats.

ASTHMA INHALERS/AUTO INJECTORS

If we hold an asthma inhaler or auto injector for your child, please be aware that we need two, one in the classroom, and one in our medical room. When that item is out of date we will contact you and ask you to provide us ones that are in date. Please make sure that you provide us in date items as a matter of priority. It is for your child's safety and must be acted upon immediately.

FILMS AT CHRISTMAS AND EASTER (AND THROUGHOUT THE SCHOOL YEAR)

Mainly at Christmas and Easter time we will sometimes arrange for the children to watch a film as an end of term treat. The films will either be a 'U' or 'PG' certificate. We would never show a film that we judged to be inappropriate. However, if you do not wish your child to watch a 'PG' certificate film then please let the school office know so that a different film can be chosen for your child's class to watch.

No Nuts Reminder

Please remember that we are a 'No Nuts' school. This means that no food brought into school by either children or staff should contain nuts. This includes Nutella (there are other alternative chocolate spreads available that do not contain nuts).
